Biggest career accomplishment involving orangutans: Teaching Nias to nurse and care
for her baby. Pulling a baby orangutan from
its mom is one of the worst things you can do
for a baby orangutan. Nias loved that baby
from the moment she was born, but she didn't
know how to care for it. Teaching her how to
nurse, gave Nias the opportunity to
flourish. She is just an amazing mom now.
